Family Medicine Clerkship

Module on Suffering

GOALS

- 1. To augment medical student insight into patient suffering.
- 2. To develop skills in the care of patients who experience suffering.
- 3. To help students identify their own responses to working with patients who are suffering.

OBJECTIVES

By the end of this clerkship students will:

- 1. Gain a vocabulary for discussing patient suffering.
- 2. Reflect on suffering as it affects patients, families, caregivers and healthcare professionals.
- 3. Learn to share thoughts and feelings about working with patients who are suffering.

METHODS

- 1. Read the required articles related to this module.
- 2. Identify a patient encounter scenario in which you witnessed patient suffering and write a one-page reflection on your experience with this patient. Briefly describe what happened and how you experienced the event. Identify questions you have about:
 - a. Your experience with this patient.
 - b. How to respond to suffering patients in general
 - c. Your personal reactions when encountering suffering.
- 3. Share and discuss your reflection with the course coordinator or a designated preceptor at the clerkship.
