Top Five Take-away Points from the March EOQ

- 1) We learned about the book "The Power of Moments," by Chip and Dan Heath. Creating memorable moments for medical students where they build insight, form connections, and take pride in their work will help translate the moment into lifelong learning.
- 2) The CDC has a <u>curriculum on antibiotic stewardship</u> for healthcare professionals. We were also privileged to have a presentation from Paul Pottinger, MD Director UWMC Infection Control Program <u>Antibiotics Update 2018</u> <u>presentation</u>.
- 3) Thanks to the courage of our medical students, the UWSOM faculty and students have been <u>adding and</u> <u>modifying curriculum to address institutionalized racism at the UWSOM</u>. While there are some overt acts of racism, the more pervasive problem of institutionalized racism refers to a system of advantage based on race that permeates our culture.
- 4) There is evidence that yoga is likely more effective than non-yoga interventions for low back pain and may be equally effective as other exercise interventions for low back pain. We learned how to teach patients a few yoga stretches for low back pain in your office.
- 5) College mentors are faculty who are matched with a group of 5-6 students from every entering class and provide them mentorship and continuity throughout their time at the UWSOM. They are a great resource for you if you are concerned about a student, whether they are struggling with academics, professionalism, or other issues.



Clerkship and Site Updates and Announcements

- Assignment Tracker: We have changed the platform for the assignment tracker, so it will look different starting with the Spring A cohort of students. The new tracker will maintain the objective-focused reorganization but, allows students to mark whether they completed an item by seeing it in clinic or doing the associated case.
- FMCases Update: FM Cases is now called "Aquifer."
- LCME Site Visit: LCME site visitors came to the UWSOM for long-anticipated site visit during the first week of March. While the full report will not be available until October 2018, the site visit team noted that the WWAMI program provides a great variety of clinical exposure with impressive integration across a vast geographic area. They also recognized that we have made significant improvements in multiple areas but there are not yet outcomes to support the effectiveness of these improvements. Other areas they mentioned are areas we are currently working on or where we know there are concerns. The site visitors did note that we have achieved significant improvement in the diversity of our medical students and that we have implemented a variety of initiatives to address student mistreatment. An overall common theme in their findings was the need for more robust central oversight.
- **CMS Documentation**: A new CMS statement was released regarding the billable use of medical student documentation by the attending attesting to its accuracy, BUT there are many questions about implementation and specifics that UWMedicine is currently researching so we haven't implemented this yet at UW. This may have very narrow utility. More guidance to come soon at a future EOQ.
- ABFM Part IV: The ABFM has announced that there will be an option to focus on teaching skills for the Practice Improvement (Part IV) section of recertification. The group felt that this is a topic worth considering, and the clerkship team will work to develop a practice improvement module. We are looking at the Patient Centered Observation Form (PCOF) as the focus, but if you have any other recommendations, please let us know by email at fmclerk@uw.edu.
- For the March 2-day EOQ, we tried something new: consolidating clerkship-specific agenda items on Friday and inviting Primary Care Practicum faculty to attend on Saturday for more general teaching tips and medical topics. Thanks to everyone for welcoming our colleagues who teach our Foundations phase students!



Power of Moments

We discussed the book "The Power of Moments" by Chip and Dan Heath. Elevating experiences that offer new insights or perspectives, as well as creating pride and connection, make powerful moments. (handout A & handout B)

We discussed that to create memorable moments one needs to incorporate at least two of the EPIC (Elevation Pride Insight Connection) elements. Many clerkship sites are already creating powerful moments for students:

- Taking students on home visits to contextualize their learning, form connections with patients, gain insight in patient lifestyles (I believe this was in the context of hospice)
- Brining in a patient to tell her story of overcoming addiction to pain medication, coping with suffering through mindfulness and meditation
- · Diesel the therapy horse! Introducing students, taking photos of them with Diesel and posting those photos.
- Managing up for students! Post a photo in the clinic to help staff and patients recognize them, use manage-up language: "we are privileged to have [student] in clinic," "I'm so excited to introduce you to [student]."
- · Match student with an OB patient who is set to deliver during clerkship, student follows patient through to delivery.

Sports Performance and Medicine

Sports Performance and Medicine was a session on using awareness and mindfulness to connect with your deeper motivation to teach and practice medicine in order to achieve higher of performance and satisfaction.

David Elaimy presented his model of how to approach high stakes situations like sports championships or patient care. We began with his performance formula:

Performance = Skill - Interference +/- Luck

While Skill cannot be addressed at the time of playing or while providing patient care, one can improve by identifying and eliminating the interferences that block optimum performance and enjoyment.

He explained that any domain can be broken down into Hardware and Software.

Hardware: External factors, other people, environment/situation, equipment/systems, to do list / schedule,outcomes, money

Software: Philosophy, thoughts, emotions

6 Rules of Hardware & Software:

- 1. Software runs Hardware
- 2. You cannot directly control the Hardware
- 3. With Awareness, you can generate any Software program at any time
- 4. You are 100% responsible for your Software
- 5. You are not your Software
- 6. Software is contagious

David suggested tools for cultivating the kind of Awareness that can allow you to dial in the desired Software in any situation. A few of the ones he presented were:

- 1. Meditation (8-20 minutes daily)
- 2. One Deep Breath (In breath for Awareness, Out for Intention)
- 3. Active Awareness (connect to visual, auditory, sensory and other elements in the present moment)
- 4. Expressive writing: write negative (or positive thoughts) down read aloud, rip and throw away
