It is based in the Research Section of the Department of Family Medicine, part of the University of Washington School of Medicine.

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CHWS News

The **UW Center for Health Workforce Studies** is celebrating its **20**th **anniversary!** Established in 1998, the UW CHWS informs workforce planning and policy, and advises both local and national policy makers, by researching issues that shape our healthcare workforce, delivery systems, and health outcomes.

The UW CHWS is funded by the National Center for Health Workforce Analysis at the U.S. Health Resources and Services Administration (HRSA) as one of nine Health Workforce Research Centers (HWRCs). Beginning in 2013 it has been funded as the HWRC on allied health. In September 2018, UW CHWS successfully competed to become one of two new HWRCs to address health equity and health workforce diversity with a new \$1.8 million four year HRSA grant. As a result, the UW CHWS now hosts two of HRSA's HWRCs.

Director Bianca Frogner's collaborative research using claims data sampling from the WWAMI region was recently highlighted on National Public Radio's All Things Considered. She found that patients who saw a physical therapist as the first line of treatment for low back pain had a 90% lower probability of being prescribed opioids.



In March, Deputy Director Sue Skillman received the Leah Layne Memorial Leadership Award by the Washington Rural Health Association (picture top). The award honors demonstrated leadership skills that exemplify the spirit, vision, foresight and dedication to rural health of the award's namesake.



Director Frogner, Deputy Director Skillman, *(picture bottom)* along with HRSA's Michelle Washko and Eleni Papadakis of Washington's Workforce Board, looked back on health workforce research and relevance to state and national health policy and its planning, during a plenary presentation at the **2018 AcademyHealth conference** in June. The UW CHWS' 20th anniversary was highlighted in the presentation.
