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Increasing College Access and Retention of Foster Care Youth: A Review of Tuition Waiver Programs

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ABSTRACT This policy brief examines the similarities and differences of various statefunded tuition waiver programs across the United States to increase college access and retention rates of foster care youth. Recommendations for policy and practice reform are offered to maximize participation and success of these programs.

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About The Brief

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The issue: Foster care youth have faced great educational disparities in terms of college access, retention, and graduation over the years. Although 70% of foster care youth report a desire to pursue a post-secondary credential¹, only 18% ever enroll², and of those, only between 3% and 5% will graduate³. In order to address these postsecondary education deficits, 23 states have created their own unique tuition waiver programs that target current and former foster care youth⁴. This brief is designed to provide some understanding of the common components of state tuition waiver programs and determine recommendations for further policy and practice reform.

It was compiled using information collected through online research and direct interviewing of the representatives responsible for program implementation. Information on each program was then compared to determine general patterns of legislative language adopted by states with tuition waivers and how each state's administrative policies govern their implementation.

Summary of Key Findings

Information on similarities observed across various state tuition waiver programs and notable strengths of certain programs are depicted in the Table below.

Recommendations for Policy and Practice Reform

- Encourage the US Department of Health and Human Services and the US Department of Education to collaborate to develop guidelines for best practice statutes that include clear, standardized language that states can adopt that would allow for easier implementation and outcome tracking.
- Increase time limits and flexibility related to tuition waiver use.
 Researchers have found that time to graduation for foster care youth differs from their non-foster care peers⁵; time limits that are connected to waiver use should be informed by this research.
- Expand eligibility criteria for tuition waiver use. Broadening age and placement requirements would allow more foster care youth to access these programs.
- Allocate federal dollars to fund tuition waivers allowing states to serve more youth.
- Require child welfare caseworkers to attend training and educational programs on various post-secondary education funding resources and referral practices. It is critical that youth have assistance with accessing all the funding resources they are eligible for, which would reduce student debt as well as financial burdens on waiver programs.
