



Meeting structure:

Listen to admin give presentation on current state of UW. Ask questions and express student opinions.

- (1) GPSS president
- (2) GPSS-appointed personnel

- 12 students:

In addition to the President and the Provost, UW Bothell and UW Tacoma's chancellors will also be invited

Executive Senator Elections

There is one (1) Executive Senator Position open!

Executive Senator Responsibilities:

- Attend all regular GPSS Meetings (3–5 per quarter)
- Attend all Executive Committee Meetings (3–5 per quarter, including summers)
- Choose your own adventure for getting more involved in GPSS—Chair a GPSS committee, form an ad hoc committee, sponsor and/or author resolutions, volunteer to assist with events, serve as an appointee on a University committee, etc.

Executive Senators terms are two (2) years or until graduation, whichever comes first. They act as a crucial form of checks and balances, representing the Senate itself on the Executive Committee. They receive monetary recognition for their extra time commitments and responsibilities in the amount of \$450 per quarter (Fall, Winter, and Spring), disbursed at the end of each academic year.




