Born in Juneau, Alaska, and raised in northern California and the Pacific Northwest, Kitty traveled extensively in Europe (she lived in London for five years) and returned to Washington to obtain an undergraduate degree in psychology and business administration from Central Washington University, and an MPH in Health Services from the UW.

What drew you to the field of public health?

In my undergraduate work I was intrigued by the science of the connection between mind and body, and had planned to apply to graduate programs focusing on psychoneuroimmunology. While I was gaining research experience as a volunteer in the Public Health Sciences Division of Fred Hutchinson Cancer Research Center, I worked closely with staff and faculty with a wide range of roles and educational backgrounds. I discovered that my planning and organizational skills were more suited to project coordination and management.

My first full-time job at Fred Hutch was managing a dietary change study in faith communities. I went on to coordinate other research at Fred Hutch that focused on how to change people's behavior, to improve their health and their lives, and I found it motivating to contribute to that. I decided to pursue an MPH because I valued the connection between research and the potential to make a positive difference in the health of individuals and communities. More >>
