Marketing a Workplace Wellness Program: Learning What Works



We are in the final year of a National Institutes of Health-funded randomized controlled trial of HealthLinks, a workplace wellness program co-developed by HPRC and the American Cancer Society. HealthLinks is specifically tailored for an often underserved employer segment: small worksites in low-wage industries. Through

a competitive process, HPRC was recently chosen by the National Cancer Institute to participate in a special training: **SPeeding Research-tested INTerventions (SPRINT)**. The goal of SPRINT is to provide scientists with business-focused startup training to bring evidence-based interventions to the public more quickly and efficiently.

The three-month training program includes in-person training in Washington, D.C., which was attended by HPRC's Peggy Hannon and Kristen Hammerback, along with Joanne Pike of the Preventive Health Partnership, who is working with HPRC on dissemination of HealthLinks. "SPRINT is a great opportunity to learn how to apply business and entrepreneurial practices to scaling up evidence-based programs that can make a difference in health," said Peggy Hannon about the training. "We look forward to putting what we are learning into practice for HealthLinks."

HPRC conducts research projects with affiliate investigators from programs at the UW and other institutions. We asked Allison Cole, a physician at UW Family Medicine, to tell us a bit about her background and current projects.

What led you to the field of health promotion research?

I grew up in Iowa and wanted to be a physician for as long as I can remember. My first job as a family physician was at a local Community Health Center. There, I learned how difficult it can be for patients and clinicians to address preventive health in the face of difficult life circumstances and chronic diseases. I'm excited to work on developing and testing programs that can improve the health of my patients.

What are you working on currently?

I'm excited to be a co-Principal Investigator, with Peggy Hannon, on the newly-funded <u>SIP</u> (see above) to evaluate the adoption and implementation of an evidence-based patient navigation intervention for colonoscopy screening. This project builds on the great work of the Health Promotion Research Center team, and will allow us to support health systems' implementation of a new colorectal cancer screening program. This evidence-based program has the potential to improve completion of colonoscopy screening
