Caitlin Mayotte, winner of the Department of Health Services 2018 Outstanding Staff Award, has been with HPRC since 2015. We asked her about her work and her background.

Tell us about your role at HPRC.

My role is part research and part administration. I work on three projects that promote health in workplaces across Washington state and one PEARLS project that examines social isolation in depressed older adults. I also manage PEARLS trainings and support PEARLS technical assistance activities. Across the center, I provide administrative support in a variety of ways to the deputy director, director, faculty, staff, and research groups.

How did you get into this field of work?

By chance! While attending Michigan State University, my undergrad focus was on Medical Anthropology, so I was already interested in people and health. After graduating, I worked at the Center for Behavioral and Decision Sciences in Medicine at the University of Michigan, a research center similar to HPRC in many ways. Working there, I learned to love research—but I wanted more direct contact with the people we served. I left Michigan, moved to Seattle for grad school at Bastyr University, and became a board-certified Acupuncturist. My eventual goal is to do acupuncture research, so I'm grateful to be at HPRC, broadening my research skills.

What keeps you passionate about health promotion research?

I'm pretty busy with work at HPRC and my family at home, but I do see a few acupuncture patients to keep up my needling skills and my connections to patients and the community. My private practice has always focused primarily on homebound older adults, so I'm thrilled to be doing research and working with the PEARLS program, which reaches and impacts that population. I love geeking out with the data, but it's working directly with people that keeps me passionate—whether it's treating them as patients, or interviewing them as part of a study.

What activities do you enjoy when not at work?

Goofing off with my family—my daughter and son love to be outside, so we play in the yard or go for walks to the park almost daily. In rare moments of solitude, I enjoy gardening, crochet, and reading (well, listening—I devour at least one audiobook per week!)
