Core Research: Improving Equity in Depression Care for Older Americans by **Expanding the Reach of PEARLS**

The U.S. Centers for Disease Control and Prevention (CDC) will once again fund HPRC as part of the Prevention Research Center (PRC) Program.

With \$3.75 million over five years, HPRC will conduct research on healthy aging, including core research to expand an evidence-based treatment for late-life depression known as the

Program to Encourage Active and Rewarding Lives (PEARLS). "The PRC Program supports our vital research, including providing effective programs to underserved communities who need them most," said HPRC Director and Principal Investigator Peggy Hannon. "A critical component of this work is engaging with community members and the organizations that serve them so that we can ensure the programs fit community needs. Our funding also supports these essential partnerships, which will inform every aspect of our new research project."

For the core research project, HPRC will study how to better connect underserved older adults with PEARLS, a program that combines education about depression, coordination with primary care physicians, and skill building for better self-sufficiency. The study's priority populations are older adults who are experiencing poverty, are community members of color, have limited English proficiency, and/or live in rural areas.

Researchers plan to reach these populations by partnering with additional organizations that are already working within these communities. More than 70 organizations currently offer PEARLS, and researchers aim to have nearly 80 new organizations actively seeing PEARLS participants within three years.

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CDC Special Interest Projects

The U.S. Centers for Disease Control and Prevention is funding HPRC with \$3.14 million over five years to participate in Special Interest Projects with two national research networks — one focusing on cancer screening and the other on epilepsy self-management.
