Testing a Safe & Confident Return to Classrooms for Latino Youth



Re-Open Schools Safely and Educate Youth (ROSSEY)

Thanks to \$4 million in funding from the National Institutes of Health, the University of Washington Health Promotion Research Center and its partners are collaborating with elementary schools in the Yakima Valley to evaluate how effective COVID testing, safety measures, and communications around COVID can be at safely increasing in-person attendance. Until a COVID vaccine is approved for youth and children, testing, safety measures, and communications around the virus may be essential for instilling confidence in a safe return to classrooms. This could be especially true for those in communities most severely affected by COVID and/or those exposed to misinformation about the virus.



Collaborating to Increase King County Vaccination Rates



We are working alongside our local partners to increase vaccination rates for underserved communities within King County, Washington. This project will specifically include Latino, Black, and immigrant multigenerational households with elders and adults working in essential industries.

In collaboration with our partners, we will create effective messaging around vaccines, support efforts to bring vaccines to people, and provide training to community navigators who can share information about vaccines in their communities.
