




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

Centering on theoretical, historical, and contemporary examples, this course explores schooling through the critical examination of research, policy, and praxis within the fields of Ethnic Studies and Education. A sample of topics covered will be: history of contemporary schooling, Affirmative Action, student organizing, politics of language, and Critical Race Theory. The course is designed for, but not limited to, those interested in careers as teachers and/or researchers in the field of Education.

Originally from White Center, Reuben Deleon is a scholar of both Ethnic Studies and Higher Education. His primary research interests are on the experiences of students of color in extracurricular activities, student organizations, and burnout

This course examines one of the most radical moments in civil rights history the 1964 Mississippi Project. Widely known as "Freedom Summer," this civil rights campaign organized a multifaceted program that challenged white supremacy and racial terror through the establishment of Freedom Schools, voter registration drives, and an alternative political party called the Mississippi Freedom Democratic Party. Even more, Freedom Summer called on Black women and men from the community, many of whom were poor and uneducated, to lead their own movement. Using primary sources, music, film, and scholarly texts, students will explore the 1964 Freedom Summer Project in order to understand diverse struggles, leadership styles, and competing interpretations of what it means to be free.
