Mustafa Kemal Atatürk

(1881-1938)

Turkish statesman and the founder of the Republic of Turkey, Mustafa Kemal was born in 1881 in Salonika, then the port city of Turkish Macedonia. After finishing the local military school, he entered the military college in Istanbul, graduating with the rank of captain in 1905.

Mustafa Kemal participated in the successful Young Turk revolution of 1908, a movement that sought to establish a constitutional government for the ailing Ottoman Empire. Because of his ambition and his outspoken criticisms, however, he was excluded from the center of power. When the World War I broke out in 1914, he was serving as military attaché in Sofia, Bulgaria. Although opposed to his country's entering the war, he won the only significant Turkish victory in 1915 against the allied forces at the Dardanelles-an event which made him a national hero.

At the end of the World War I, the Ottoman government capitulated to the Allies, and in May 1919, Mustafa Kemal was sent to Eastern Anatolia, charged with disbanding still-mobilized army units. Instead, he began to organize resistance

Atatürk's Address To The Young People Of Turkey

O Turkish Youth! Your primary duty is to preserve and to defend forever Turkish independence and the Republic

This obligation is the very basis of your existence and future, and it must remain as your most valuable treasure. In the future, you may have enemies, at home and abroad, who will want to deprive you of this treasure. One day, if you find yourself compelled to defend your independence and the Republic, you must assume your obligation without any hesitation, regardless of the prevailing circumstances. Your opportunities may turn out to be extremely limited; and conditions, unfavorable. The enemies conspiring against the independence of your country may have an unprecedented record of victories behind them. By force or by deceit, all the fortresses of the country may be captured, the naval bases occupied, the armies dispersed, and every corner of your fatherland invaded. Even more devastating may be the ignorance and treachery of those in power within the country. These traitors may even align their personal interests with the political ambitions of the enemy. Impoverished and exhausted, the nation may be on the verge of destruction.

O child of Turkey's future! Even under such dire circumstances it is your duty to save Turkish independence and the Republic. You will find the strength you need within your noble blood.


groups and convened in September 1919 a congress of nationalist delegates at Sivas. Under his leadership, there emerged a provisional government claiming to represent the Turkish people.

After the Turkish War of Independence and the overthrow of the Ottoman Sultanate, Mustafa Kemal negotiated a new peace treaty with the Allies. The Treaty of Lausanne (Switzerland), signed in July 1923, recognized Turkey's full sovereign rights over all its territory. On 29 October 1923, Turkey was proclaimed a republic, with Mustafa Kemal as the first president.

With astounding energy, he then set out on a series of reforms, which would profoundly affect every level of Turkish society. In 1924, he abolished the caliphate (the office of the spiritual head of Islam) and repressed religious activity. In 1926 the Holy Law of Islam was replaced by the Swiss Civil Code, and in 1928 the Latin alphabet was adopted for written Turkish. In 1934 women who had limited rights under Islamic law were given suffrage and became legally emancipated. In the same year, when every Turkish citizen had to adopt a surname, the nation honored Mustafa Kemal by giving him the name Atatürk, meaning "Father of the Turks."

On 10 November 1938 Atatürk died, leaving behind a nation that owed its very existence to him. His remains rest at a mausoleum on a hill overlooking Ankara, the

capital of Turkey.




This address forms the final part of a long speech that Atatürk delivered to the Grand National Assembly in October 1927. The speech dealt with the World War I era, the Turkish War of Independence (1919-23), and the reforms introduced during the first years of the Republic. The address printed here charges Turkish youth with the responsibility of safeguarding the country's independence, and it is one of the better known documents in the history of modern Turkey.



YURTTAN HABERLER (NEWS FROM TURKEY)

- * Turkish Central Bank (Türk Merkez Bankasi) was given the Golden Mercury award in an international meeting held in Karachi, Pakistan. The award, accepted by Osman Siklan, the President of Merkez Bankasi, is given for achievements in the field of economy.
- * TRT, Turkish Television and Radio, will start broadcasting in color in 1984. A 45-minute experimental programming is now in progress.
- * Turkey officially declared that the Turkish Government supports the United Nations Security Council resolution calling for an immediate withdrawal of Argentine troops from the Falkland Island.
- * General Kenan Evren, Head of State, delivered a major speech in Bursa. He stated that he was confident Turkey would stick to the time-table planned after the Sept. 12, 1980 military takeover. The revision of the Constitution by the Citizens' Assembly is progressing as planned.
- * Istanbul Metrosu yine gündemde. 4. Levent Yenikapı arasında yapımı düşünülen metro 100 milyar liraya çıkacak.
- * Nil Burak Türkiye'de Müzik-San tarafından yılın sanatçısı seçildi.
- * 39 kişinin katili 75 yaşındaki ünlü şaki "Cezo" çatışmada öldü.
- * Türkiye, onbinde 3.5 oranı ile boşanmaların en az olduğu ülkeler arasında yer almakta. A.B.D. 'de oran onbinde 53.

Both meetings lasted over three hours each due to the number of issues in need of discussion.
