Research Updates

New Research Funding

The UW Autism Center and the Seattle Children's Research Institute are launching a collaborative research project under the direction of Drs. John Welsh and UW Autism Center Director, Annette Estes, with UW Autism Center researchers Drs. Jeffrey Munson and Stephen Dager. The grant from the National Institutes of Health will enable them to investigate brain function through a novel approach called eye-blink conditioning in children age 8-12 who have participated in previous UWAC research studies.

New Finding: Reducing Parent Stress

Drs. Annette Estes, Jessica Greenson, Jeffrey Munson, former ESDM research team lead, Dr. Jamie Winter, and former UW Autism Center director, Dr. Geraldine Dawson, were recently published in the Journal of Autism and Developmental Disorders for their work on the impact of a parent-coaching intervention on parentingrelated stress and sense of competence. Results of the study suggested that a parent-coaching intervention may help maintain parental adjustment directly after a child is diagnosed with ASD. Congratulations, Dr. Estes and colleagues!
