Assessing and Teaching Social Skills for School-Aged Children with ASD

Participants will expand their knowledge of social skills assessment and treatment of school-age children with autism who have a range of communication abilities. This training is interactive, with participants receiving personalized feedback on their approach to assessing and teaching social skills. The two-session format allows participants to apply what they learned at the first session and then receive additional input and feedback at the second training session. This approach should ensure that participants gain functional, applicable skills for their everyday teaching needs.

This workshop will be taught by Amy Rodda, PhC, CCC-SLP.

About the instructor: Amy is a doctoral candidate at the University of Washington and a speech-language pathologist with over 10 years of experience working with children with social communication difficulties in a variety of clinical settings. Her research examines the characteristics and predictors of peer competence and friendship in school-age children with autism.



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
