Greetings from the University of Washington

Dear Participant,

The University of Washington Beyond High School (UW-BHS) project began with a survey of Tacoma high school seniors in 2000. The project expanded beyond Tacoma in 2003 with the addition of seniors in the Clover Park high schools (Clover Park and Lakes), Mukilteo high schools (Kamiak and Mariner), and three private schools (Bellarmine, Charles Wright, and Life Christian). We are very pleased to have a very strong and positive working relationship with all participating high schools in the UW-BHS project.


The senior survey, taken in the spring of students' senior year, is our baseline round of data collection. The first follow-up survey is conducted in the year following high school graduation. For those of you who were in the Classes of 2000, 2002 and 2003, we have completed this follow-up survey with about 90 percent of students who completed the senior survey. For those of you in the Class of 2004, we will be contacting you very soon for a 5 minute telephone (or web) survey.

The Class of 2005 senior survey, to be conducted this spring, will be the last senior class to be included in our project. This is not the end of our project, but merely the end of the beginning. With more than 9,000 baseline surveys (from the Class of 2000 to the Class of 2005), our primary efforts will now be devoted to follow-up surveys. Our plan is conduct follow-up surveys every five to 10 years to measure how your lives are unfolding. In the second follow-up survey, about 6 to 7 years after high school graduation, we will inquire about additional schooling and the early stages of your work and family lives. One of the models for our project is the Wisconsin Longitudinal Survey of the Class of 1957. This project is still going strong after four decades and the current focus is on retirement.

Filling out a survey may not be the most exciting thing to do, especially if you are a high school senior. But as the years pass, we hope that you will see the UW project as an old friend, who stops by from time to time, to check on how you are doing. 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Did you know that ...

1. High school seniors, on average, spend more time on sports, extra-curricular activities, and working per week than on homework. (See page 2)
2. The sports which have the most participation by students are track and soccer. (See page 2)
3. Between 3% and 4% of graduates from the classes of 2000, 2002 and 2003 are serving in the U.S. military. (See page 3)
4. Three out of four seniors still live in Western Washington one year after graduation. (See page 4)

Results from the Senior Surveys of 2004

High School Seniors are Very Busy People!

In the senior survey, we asked about participation and time spent on activities outside of school, including sports, other extracurricular activities, homework, and work. Here are some results from the Class of 2004. About 3/4 of seniors report that they were tired in class at least 7 or more times during the year. No wonder!



Per week, seniors spend **3 hours 10 minutes** on homework



5 hours 35 minutes on sports




4 hours 7 minutes on other extracurricular activities



and **12 hours 25 minutes** working at a paying job.

Sports Involvement

Percentage of boys and girls in the Class of 2004 who are involved in 0, 1, 2, or 3 sports.



In the senior survey, students were asked to list any sports they participate in, including intramural as well as varsity sports.

Almost half of boys have at least one extracurricular sport and about one third of girls are involved in sports. This is a real change from the past when few girls were athletes.



Which sports were the most common among 2004 seniors?



Results from the Classes of 2000, '02, and '03 Follow-Up Surveys

College Plans of High School Seniors Compared with Actual Enrollment One Year After Graduation



How well do college plans predict college enrollment? In the chart to the left, we compare college plans of high school seniors with actual enrollment one year later. The results are pretty close, although there are some students who thought they were not going to college, but wound up going. And, of course, life sometimes intervenes and some students who planned to attend college have to postpone their college ambitions.




Some Students Go into Military Service After Graduation



About 3 to 4 percent of high school seniors enter military service within a year after high school graduation. See the graph to the right for details.

Approximately 5 to 6 percent of seniors say they have plans to enter the military some time in their lifetime, perhaps after college.




PROMISE OF CONFIDENTIALITY

All of the individual survey responses in our study are treated as strictly confidential. Names and all identifying information are removed from the data files. Our research is focused on averages and overall patterns, not individual responses. We update and store contact information (addresses, telephone number, email address) for each respondent so that we can conduct surveys in future years. This contact information is kept separate from all our other data files.

Results from Senior and Follow-Up Surveys

Comparing Work Hours During High School and After Graduation




In an average week, 2/3 of high school seniors work up to 20 hours per week, but almost 1/3 do not work at all.


During their first year in college, work patterns change: fewer students work than in high school. But, if they work, college students work more hours than high school seniors.

Almost 1/2 of high school graduates who are not enrolled in college are working full time, 1/4 work between half- and full-time, and only 1/5 are not working at all.


This shows that many non-college-bound high school graduates have become productive members of the workforce.



High School Seniors




College Freshmen




Recent HS Grads, Non-Students
